It has been two years since the Energy Resource Center (ERC) was launched. The ERC provides tools to help customers manage and reduce their energy consumption and save money on their monthly utility bill. The Energy Resource Center includes an online energy audit that allows you to customize to your home as well as use numerous online calculators to find additional savings. In addition, electric customers will be emailed a personalized monthly bill overview to identify factors that may have impacted your energy use. Reminder: Summer Peak Time-of-Use

PWC made the switch to Summer Time-of-Use (TOU) Rates last month. Beat the Peak and make TOU Rates work for you! Summer Peak will run through October between the hours of 3 p.m. 7 p.m. Rates for electricity used during Off-Peak hours will cost 35% less than Peak and will occur 20 hours on weekdays and all day on weekends and PWC-observed holidays. PWC also offers an optional Whole Home, Whole Business rate that can help you save money on electric bills by offering a Super Off-Peak rate every night from 9:00 p.m. to 5:00 a.m. To see if the new Whole Home, Whole Business rate is right for you, call 910-483-1382 to speak with a PWC representative.

Water Quality Report Now Available

Your hometown utility is committed to providing high-quality drinking water and our staff goes above and beyond in making sure our water meets all regulatory requirements set by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). In 2023, PWC treated more than 9 billion gallons of drinking water for our 90,000 customers. During that same time, we administered more than 150,000 tests to ensure the safety of the water and

Don't Let Summer Run Up Your Utility Bill



The high temperatures of Summer are in the forecast, which can have a big impact on your bill. A few simple conservation tips can add up and help make a difference.

Electrical Bill:

- Turn off the lights when not in use and use LED lightbulbs
- Keep the thermostat at the highest comfortable level in the summer and use a fan to blow air on you to help cool you down
- · Wear light weight clothing to stay cool
- Reduce hot water usage. Shorter showers and running your clothes washer with cold water make a big impact
- Use window blinds or drapes or other window coverings to help windows keep out the temperatures from the outside
- Make sure your AC unit is maintained per manufacturer's recommendations and air filters replaced on schedule
- Be mindful of summer peak hours. Peak Time-of-Use Rates, when energy is in highest demand and the most expensive, are weekdays from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Water and Sewer Bill:

- Make sure you turn outside faucets off after watering plants and flowers
- Check your backflow and sprinkler system for leaks
- Install a rain sensor for your sprinkler system if you don't have one
